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## New world in education opens

**WALKING INTO** Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music is like entering a musical instrument – a *Stradivarius* of perfect acoustics and artistry. This is NUS' brand new Conservatory – a three-storey, 19,300-sq m building adjacent to the University Cultural Centre, in the heart of NUS Cultural Hub.

Dr Liu Thai Ker, architect-planner and Director of RSP Architects Planners & Engineers Pte Ltd which designed the building with German consultant Eckhard Kahle of Kahle Acoustics (in collaboration with UK-based Theatre Projects Consultants), said that the shape of the building is driven mainly by acoustics, with many "wedge spaces" which prevent echoes from resonating.

Besides one of the largest recording studios in Asia, the Conservatory also

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boasts Asia's first "shoe-box" concert hall. So called because of its long, narrow and tall shape, the shoe-box hall provides plenty of lateral reflections – contributing to excellent acoustics. Practice rooms are soundproof, sporting the "box-within-a-box" feature. Each room, with its suspended ceiling, floor, and special two-layered walls, is literally a room floating within a room – effectively sealing off outside vibrations.

The building houses 44 practice rooms, 31 teaching studios and seven spacious ensemble rooms for rehearsals and performances. There is also a recital studio equipped with video-conferencing facilities, a music library, music technology labs and smart classrooms.

Launched in July 2003, exciting times are in store for the Conservatory which now has about 180 full-time students from 13 countries. Said Dr Gene Aitken, the Conservatory's Director: "Going forward, one of the major initiatives of the Conservatory is to integrate technology into the classrooms so that our students are prepared to embrace technology in an ever-changing global music industry. In addition, we are developing a recording arts programme and in time to come, a Masters programme. We are also looking into introducing a summer programme for students and educators from throughout the world."

Said NUS Deputy President and Provost, Professor Tan Chorh Chuan: "The new building provides the infrastructure for music to be taught at a standard benchmarked to the top conservatories in the world. Leveraging on our partnership with the renowned Peabody Institute, our vision is for the Conservatory to evolve into a music institution of international standing and quality."

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
